FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

HEALTH

Tribal Behavioral Health

Department of Health and Human Services

Deadline: May 15, 2023

Awards up to \$250,000; no match required

Eligible: Federally recognized American Indian/Alaska Native (AI/AN) tribes, tribal organizations, Urban Indian Organizations, or consortia of tribes or tribal organizations.

The purpose of this program is to prevent and reduce suicidal behavior and substance use/misuse, reduce the impact of trauma, and promote mental health among American Indian/Alaska Native (AI/AN) youth, up to and including age 24, by building a healthy network of systems, services, and partnerships that impact youth.

SAMHSA expects this program will be a model for community change that integrates a community's culture, resources, and readiness to address suicide prevention and substance use/misuse among AI/AN youth. This NOFO will remain open for three fiscal years. Applicants that do not receive funding are eligible to apply for the following fiscal year.

Recovery Community Services Program-Statewide Network

Department of Health and Human Services

Deadline: May 30, 2023

\$245,000-\$600,000; no match required

The purpose of this program is to strengthen community-based recovery organizations, their statewide networks of recovery stakeholders, and specialty and general healthcare systems as key partners in the delivery of state and local recovery support services (RSS) through collaboration, systems improvement, public health messaging, and training conducted for or with key recovery groups.

Behavioral Health Partnership for Early Diversion of Adults and Youth

Department of Health and Human Services

Deadline: June 9

Awards: Up to \$330,000

Eligibility: Indian tribes or tribal organizations (as defined in Section 4 of the Indian Self-Determination and Education and Assistance Act)

The purpose of this program is to establish or expand programs that divert adults and youth with a mental illness or a co-occurring disorder (COD) from the criminal or juvenile justice system to community-based mental health and substance use disorder services (SUD) and other supports prior to arrest and booking.

NATURAL RESOURCES

Funding for Firewood Banks

Alliance for Green Heat

Due: Applications will be processed on a rolling basis until the end of summer in 2023 or until they run out. Eligible firewood banks can apply by filling out the online application at this site: firewoodbanks.org/copy-of-overview.

Almost any items needed to run your firewood bank is an eligible expense except for food & drink, entertainment, lobbying, and items over \$5,000. Eligible expenses include chain saws, splitters, tarps, moisture meters, conveyor belts, trailers, wheelbarrows, safety equipment, first aid kits, equipment repair, building materials for firewood sheds or tool sheds, educational materials/activities, sales tax, signage, travel, gas money, and miscellaneous supplies like small tools that cost less than \$20. Firewood banks are invited to add other additional items not listed here that they use or think may be helpful.

Composting and Food Waste Reduction (CFWR) Pilot Project

Department of Agriculture

Deadline: June 15

Awards: \$55,000-\$400,000; 25% match required

Eligibility: Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized)

This program provides financial assistance to municipalities, school districts, counties, local governments, special district governments, tribal governments (State-designated Indian Tribes, Federally Recognized Indian Tribal Governments), or tribal organizations to carry out food waste reduction and composting objectives.

COMMUNITY INFRASTRUCTURE

Clean Energy Technology Deployment on Tribal Lands

Department of Energy

Deadline: May 16

Award: \$100,000-\$500,000; 20% match (which in may be reduced to 10% based on financial need/median household income of the tribal community)

The DOE Office of Indian Energy is soliciting applications from Indian Tribes, which include Alaska Native Regional Corporations and Village Corporations, Intertribal Organizations, and Tribal Energy Development Organizations to: (1) Install clean energy generating system(s) and energy efficiency measure(s) for Tribal Building(s) (Topic Area 1); or, (2) Deploy community-scale clean energy generating system(s) or energy storage on Tribal Lands (Topic Area 2); or, (3) Install integrated energy system(s) for autonomous operation (independent of the traditional centralized electric power grid) to power a single or multiple Essential Tribal Buildings during emergency situations or for tribal community resilience (Topic Area 3); or, (4) Provide electric power to unelectrified tribal buildings (Topic Area 4).

Bipartisan Infrastructure Law: Energy Improvement in Rural or Remote Area

Department of Energy

Due: June 28

Funding: \$5M-\$100M; no match required

Eligibility: Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized and not federally recognized), non-profits
DOE's Energy Improvements in Rural or Remote Areas (ERA) Program will provide financial investment, technical assistance, and other resources to advance clean energy demonstrations and energy solutions that are

replicable and scalable. ERA aims to fund clean energy projects with three specific goals: 1. Deliver measurable benefits to energy customers in rural or remote areas by funding replicable energy projects that lower energy costs, improve energy access and resilience, and/or reduce environmental harm; 2. Demonstrate new rural or remote energy system models using climate-resilient technologies, business structures that promote economic resilience, new financing mechanisms, and/or new community engagement best practices; and 3. Build clean energy knowledge, capacity, and self-reliance in rural America.

Cultural and Community Resilience

National Endowment for the Humanities

Due: May 16, 2023

Grant Amount: \$150,000; no match required

Eligibility: Federally recognized tribes

The National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) Division of Preservation and Access is accepting applications for the Cultural and Community Resilience program. This program supports community-based efforts to mitigate climate change and COVID-19 pandemic impacts, safeguard cultural resources, and foster cultural resilience through identifying, documenting, and/or collecting cultural heritage and community experience. The program prioritizes projects from disadvantaged communities in the United States or its jurisdictions, and the NEH encourages applications that employ inclusive methodologies.

Community Connect Grant Program

Department of Agriculture

Deadline: June 20

Awards: \$100,000-\$500,000; 15% match

The Community Connect Grant Program provides financial assistance to eligible applicants that will provide service at or above the Broadband Grant Speed to all premises in rural, economically-challenged communities where broadband service does not exist. The deployment of broadband services on a “community-oriented connectivity” basis stimulates economic development and provides enhanced educational and health care opportunities in rural areas.

LANGUAGE, CULTURE, & PRESERVATION

Digital Projects for the Public

National Endowment for the Humanities

Deadline June 14, 2023

Awards: Up to \$400,000; no match required

Eligible: Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized), non-profits

The Digital Projects for the Public program supports projects that interpret and analyze humanities content in primarily digital platforms and formats, such as websites, mobile applications and tours, interactive touch screens and kiosks, games, and virtual environments. \$100,000 (Prototyping grants); \$400,000 (Production grants); Maximum award amount \$30,000 (Discovery grants).

Humanities Collections and Reference Resources

National Endowment for the Humanities

Deadline: July 18, 2023

Award: Up to \$350,000; no match

Eligible: Nonprofits, Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized)

This program supports projects that provide an essential underpinning for scholarship, education, and public engagement in the humanities. It strengthens efforts to extend the reach of humanities collections and make their intellectual content widely accessible. Awards also support the creation of reference resources that facilitate the use of cultural materials, from works that provide basic information quickly to tools that synthesize and codify knowledge of a subject for in-depth investigation.

Mentoring Programs for Youth in the Juvenile Justice System

Dept. of Justice

Due: May 18

Award: Up to \$500,000; no match

Eligible: Non-profits, Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments)

OJJDP seeks to fund mentoring organizations to enhance and expand mentoring services for youth who are involved in the juvenile justice system. Depending on the nature of an applicant's proposed project, youth and family partnership could consist of one or more of the following: Individual-level partnership in case planning and direct service delivery (before, during, and after contact with youth-serving systems). Agency-level partnership (e.g., in policy, practice, and program development, implementation, and evaluation; staffing; advisory bodies; budget development). System-level partnership (e.g., in strategic planning activities, system improvement initiatives, advocacy strategies, reform efforts).

Tribal Court Improvement Program

Department of Health and Human Services

Deadline: June 15, 2023

Awards: \$50,000-\$150,000; no match required

Eligible: Native American tribal organizations (other than Federally recognized tribal governments)

Native American tribal governments (Federally recognized)

The Administration for Children and Families, Children's Bureau announces the availability of awards to provide tribes and tribal consortia the opportunity to compete for grants to enable tribal courts to design and implement projects and/or activities to assess, expand, or enhance the effectiveness of tribal courts.
